PASTOR'S CORNER

FOUR MONTHS AND COUNTING.....An Interim's notes

Many of you, or a few of you, or none of you, or all of you are wondering: "What's happening with the search process for our next pastor?" While you have already accomplished much: saying good-bye to Jim Stewart, searching and finding an Interim, seeking and gaining approval from your Committee on Ministry/ Pastoral Transitions Commission (**PTC**) for the New Beginnings work to stand as your Missions Study, the next steps have already begun --your Nominating Committee has solicited your input and is diligently working to bring to you, for your vote, a slate of candidates for your Pastor Nominating Committee (**PNC**). More specifically....

First, your Nominating Committee met to understand what the **PNC** would be doing to be able to accurately discern who God might call and then agree on recruiting candidates. They then turned to you after developing a list of desired qualifications and solicited your ideas for candidates. Next, with your input and with their own suggestions, the Nominating Committee carefully compiled a list and began to prayerfully share with one another their thoughts about candidates. Working with a list of 70+ names, they had/have their work cut out for them. Determining who they believe God can use in this essential role, agreeing on these individuals, contacting individuals-- based on the replies of those who feel God's called them to this service either celebrating, or, if individuals do not feel God's leading and say "no," the Nominating Committee will be going back to the drawing board, discussing again, reaching out again, hearing replies again; repeat, these are the steps they take as long as necessary to have an excellent slate to bring to you. The good news is your Nominating Committee is working hard; they represent you well and are excited that you have so many excellent potential candidates. When the Nominating Committee has seven individuals that they have discerned God is calling to serve on the **PNC**, they will notify Session. The next step: A Called Session meeting to set a Congregational Meeting, (maybe an email vote) occurs, and then Session calls a Congregational Meeting. Two weeks notice for a Congregational meeting is required. The Congregation will meet, hear the slate of candidates and then vote. Once your **PNC** is elected, the liaison from the **PTC**, (Rev. Jim Gilbert) will meet with them for an orientation.

Your **PNC** after determining how it will work, who will act as secretary/recorder/IT person, who will moderate/co-moderate etc., quorum, voting process, sorting out all the details will turn to writing/creating your Ministry Information Form (**MIF**), a sort of church resume. This process can be slow, moderate, or fast. Variables like finding a time to meet, researching, discussing, composing,

editing, and life events—children sick, spouse sick, crazy Kentucky weather (I'm just sayin') snow storm in May???! Eventually the **MIF** is complete, and the **PTC** weighs in and your **MIF** is posted online. Now, the **PNC** begins to examine the Personal Information Forms (**PIF**) that have been matched with your **MIF** from the denominational computer matching service. Other matching options exist: self-referral, a submission from someone who has been prompted by a member of the congregation, or another pastor who knows the church... Again, this process is affected by many variables: getting references, speaking with candidates, waiting to hear from references to speak with them; interviews-skype, face to face, Face Time... Eventually, praying, speaking to others, listening to each other and the Holy Spirit nudge of your **PNC** to reach out to the candidate(s) they feel God is calling to Danville Presbyterian. Visits to Danville, talks about terms of call, a final discussion with the **PTC** and then the **PNC** notifies Session that they need to call a Congregational Meeting to hear the **PNC's** report and recommendation for your next installed Minister of Word and Sacrament.

Your **PNC**, once they are meeting, will offer updates on their work as much as possible but are bound by strict confidentiality! *The steps listed above don't fit into a neat timetable*, but rest assured, they will be meeting, acting and moving forward...so patience. **Your role in this important time of spiritual discernment is prayer, prayer, and more prayer.** Pray for your Nominating Committee; pray for those who will and should say "yes" to serving on the **PNC**; pray for the pastor who will come to you, and pray for all those involved in bringing you the right individual, will have wisdom, clarity, and guidance from God's own Spirit.

STEPHEN MINISTRY

Are you being called?

For the past 18 years, this church has trained and supported members who walk one-on-one with others facing challenges in life. The Stephen Ministry program has helped people in situations from grief and illness to retirement and divorce.

Becoming a Stephen Minister requires an application and interview, followed after selection by 50 hours of training and a 2-year commitment to participate in caring relationships and in twice-monthly supervision and continuing education sessions.

It also requires prayer and reflection, to discern whether you are being called to this ministry.

The church's Stephen Ministry will, in the coming weeks, be asking you to consider whether you have the skills and the call to become a Stephen Minister or Stephen Leader. We will be recruiting Stephen Ministers for a training class that will begin in the fall. We will also be seeking people whose leadership skills call them to be a Stephen Leader. (Training as a Stephen Leader is available at sessions given by Stephen Ministry St. Louis at a variety of times and places.)

SESSION REPORT

The Session held its regular meeting on March 20, 2018. This is a summary of the business conducted at that meeting.

COMMITTEE REPORTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Budget and Finance (Jim Boyd) The Session reviewed the February financial report, which showed that revenues remain strong. About 2/3 of our revenue comes from pledged giving.

Year-to-date budgeted giving: \$76, 605.50

Year-to-date actual giving: \$117,493.32

Youth Formation. (Hannah McIntyre) Hannah reported that 27 youth and 4 adults are planning to go to Mountain Top. More adults are needed.

Communications (Steve Messer) At the recommendation of the committee, the following were approved: 1.) that the Konica Minolta copier be replaced with a Toshiba copier (\$100/month savings); 2.) that the IT services for the church be changed from Integrity to Dean Dorton of Lexington. (15% savings)

Facilities and Grounds (Roger Hartner) Ten new HVAC units have been installed; five panic buttons have been ordered; new sprinkler heads have been ordered; one or both pumps of the boiler for the sanctuary will need to be replaced.

Nominating (Charlie Boyd) The committee has received over 70 names to be considered for the Pastoral Nominating Committee. A motion was approved to have the Session vote by e-mail to call a Congregational Meeting when the committee is ready to submit nominees for the PNC.

Worship and Music (Rita Bloom) The Session approved a recommendation from the committee to have one service during the summer (Memorial Day — Labor Day.) The time being considered is 9:30 AM. Details will be discussed and reported at the next Session meeting.

Report from Presbytery (Peggy Tudor) Based on membership, our church is entitled to one more commissioner, who will be elected at a future meeting.

OLD/NEW BUSINESS

Stephen Ministry. Stephen Leaders are being sought for a new class beginning in August. Stephen Ministry Sunday will be April 22.

Children's Place Daycare Closure. Mary Covell discussed the issue of child care pending the closure of the Children's Place in August. On behalf of our church, Jane will offer to host a public discussion of the issue.

LOCAL MISSION SPOTLIGHT: CASA OF THE BLUEGRASS

Have you ever wondered why our church has so many committees, and what exactly they do? Some committees' work is obvious from their name, but the Local Mission Committee would like for you to be aware of the many wonderful non-profits in our community that do amazing things, which we have chosen to support financially. Each month we will highlight an organization in Boyle County that your Local Mission Committee supports.

CASA of the Bluegrass works to advance the best interests of abused and neglected children in the Anderson, Boyle, Franklin, and Mercer Family Court Systems through the training and support of community volunteers who serve as Court Appointed Special Advocates working with children, the family, and the court. After 35 hours of intensive training, a CASA volunteer is appointed to a child or a sibling set by the Family Court Judge to perform an independent investigation of the child's situation. CASA volunteers get to know the child, biological family, foster family, extended family, school officials, physicians, therapists, and others involved in the child's life. The volunteer then submits formal reports with recommendations to the Family Court Judge at every scheduled hearing. Last year, through Local Mission, the church contributed enough to allow the Boyle County office to recruit, screen, train, and supervise 7 new CASA volunteers who served a total of 18 child victims in 2017. This year, our contribution will also go to funding new volunteer screening and training for CASA. This is just one of many ways our church continues its legacy of service to Danville and Boyle County.


